"The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, his mercies never come to an end, they are new every morning." –

Lamentations 3:22-23a

"Have mercy on me, O God, according to your steadfast love; according to your abundant mercy, blot out my transgressions." –

Psalm 51:1 (NRSVue)

(Jesus said), "Which of these three do you think was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of robbers?" The expert in the law replied, "The one who had *mercy* on him." Jesus told him, "Go and do likewise." –

Luke 10:36 (NIV)

Beloved Church Family,

Over these last few weeks, there is one word I have heard repeated over and over again – *mercy*. It began at the Inaugural Prayer Breakfast, when Bishop Budde asked the president to "have mercy" on various groups of people who might be afraid. I won't be going into the substance of her message here, but as I've watched the ripples of her sermon move through the theological and political spheres in the days that followed, that word – *mercy* – has stuck with me. What is *mercy*, anyway? What does it mean for us? What (if anything) does it ask of us?

In the Bible, the word mercy can be found nearly 350 times, and it's used in a couple different ways. It can be a descriptor of God's love for us, a plea to God for forgiveness and pardon, and it can be a directive from God (through the prophets and Jesus) for how we are to interact with one another. Sometimes, it's also translated as "loving kindness" or "compassion." These alternate translations give us an idea of what mercy is all about.

At its core, mercy is about choosing to love someone even if they haven't "earned" it. It points to a persistent feeling of benevolence towards those who are poor, afflicted, oppressed, or downtrodden. But, it doesn't stop there. To show mercy, one's <u>feelings</u> of compassion towards those who are suffering must also be linked to the <u>desire</u> to alleviate that suffering AND the <u>choice</u> to work towards their relief, even if you believe they don't necessarily "deserve" it. As an example – At Jesus' arrest, Peter cut off the ear of a soldier who came to take Jesus away. Jesus showed mercy when he stopped Peter and healed the soldier's ear. We may feel that the soldier deserved what he got, but Jesus' compassion and mercy moved him to heal what had been hurt.

Mercy, like grace, is often counterintuitive through the lens of societies like ours that have built themselves on merit. In our cultural understanding, those who are financially comfortable, healthy, and socially accepted have lived in a way that has merited them that level of living. By contrast, we can sometimes assume that those who are impoverished, sick, and socially outcast have, one way or another, earned that status as well. It is difficult for us to understand the concept of unmerited pardon, unearned forgiveness, and unwarranted compassion. And, it is often hard for us to find compassion for those who, in our eyes, don't deserve it.

However, God asks us time and time again to share the blessings we have received. We have received such abundant gifts from God – wonderful things like love, forgiveness, hope, life, wisdom, and yes, mercy. If we are to live as disciples of Jesus Christ, we must find ways to grow in our ability to receive and share these

many blessings. Therefore, during this month that is so often celebrated as a month of love, I am challenging myself to focus on mercy (one facet of Godly love) for these 28 days, and I invite you to join me. For each week of February, I will be focusing on a different aspect of mercy in my daily prayers, as I attempt to understand the mercy I have received, and to stretch myself in my ability (and willingness) to share mercy with others. I hope you will follow along with me in this spiritual practice.

Week 1 – February 1st-7th
When have I experienced the mercy of God? What did it feel like to receive unmerited mercy?

Week 2 – February 8th-14th
For what choices, actions, or thoughts do I seek
God's mercy today?

Week 3 – February 15th-21st
Where do I see mercy being given and received between people today?

Week 4 – February 22nd-28th
What does Jesus' instruction to "Go and do likewise" mean for me specifically? What is one way I can show mercy, loving kindness, and compassion today?

Throughout these next 28 days, may we each feel the healing touch of God's mercy in our lives, and may we each find the strength to share that mercy as readily as we receive it.



St. John's Book Club will be meeting on Wednesday, March 12, to discuss their newest pick, Between Two Kingdoms by Suleika Jaouad which should be available for check out in the church library this month.

This book is a memoir of a 23 year old correspondent who became ill with leukemia. She spent four years fighting for her life and chronicling the saga in a column for The New York Times. After treatments, she realized that she had no idea how to live. How does someone reenter the world, reclaim what was lost and live again? Jaouad embarked, with her dog, Oscar, on a 100-day, 15,000-mile road trip across the country to meet strangers who had written to her during her years in the hospital: a

teenage girl in Florida also recovering from cancer; a teacher in California grieving the death of her son; a death-row inmate in Texas who'd spent his own years confined to a room. She learned that the divide between sick and well is porous, that many of us will travel back and forth between these realms throughout our lives. "Between Two Kingdoms" is a story of survivorship and what it means to begin again.
