Beloved Church Family,

With just over a month left before our nation chooses its next president, it's more important than ever for the church to lift up a message of hope. That is why St. John UCC has joined churches across the United States in a campaign for kindness. It was started by a Methodist congregation called "Resurrection" in the Kansas City area, and it was born from the radical idea that we can choose to be kind to one another, even if we don't agree. As they state on the campaign's website, "A vote for kindness is a step toward overcoming the polarization in our country through civility and respect."

In this moment, when we are in the thick of political campaign ads, division and polarization are the daily bread we have been offered by society. As a country divided into "red" and "blue", we are told that those on the other side of the political spectrum are, at best, gullible, and at worst, evil. However, the vast majority of us share the same ideals (eg: safety, freedom, justice, and peace). We may have different ideas of how to realize those ideals, but the desire behind them is the same. If we talk to each other and expect to find polarizing differences, we will find them. Similarly, when we expect to find common ground, we will be successful. We, the everyday people of the US, are not nearly as divided as it feels.

The red/blue division is blurred further when we realize how interconnected we already are. Like many communities, families, and churches in this nation, we cannot be labeled as ALL red or ALL blue. Instead, at St. John, we exist as a beautiful and dynamic shade of purple. This is not a new phenomenon, as the Body of Christ has been purple from the very beginning. Even Jesus' original disciples spanned the political spectrum from Simon the Zealot on the far left, to Matthew the Tax Collector on the far right. Jesus did not expect his followers to shape themselves into carbon copies of one another. Instead, he called them to be united through their love of God, while using their unique perspectives, histories, and talents to continue his ministry in the world.

As his disciples in the world today, this is the privilege and challenge Jesus extends to us, too. It is our continued call, as we serve as the Body of Christ in the world, to find common ground on which we can stand together. It is a tall order, to be sure, but we are blessed to have the solid foundation of God's hand supporting us, the Spirit's power strengthening us, and Christ's love connecting us as one.

Healing isn't something that happens quickly, and we shouldn't expect to achieve it without a LOT of hard work and determination. However, as with any large goal, it is best to take it one day, one hour, or even one moment at a time. And, we cannot wait for someone else to take the first step. Leaning on Jesus' instruction to "do unto others as you would have them do to you", we are called to treat others with the goodness we hope to receive in return. So, as we prepare to exercise our hard-won right to vote on November 5th, let us also exercise our faith in Jesus Christ by choosing, day by day, to plant seeds of kindness, compassion, humility, respect, and love. There's no telling what goodness might grow in this fertile, purple ground beneath our feet.


Virtual Worship Services
